Stalin Culture

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course will examine second-world modernity in its most ambitious cultural expression. Texts will include classic Stalinist novels, poetry selected for its lofty ideological resonance, musical comedies such as Pyr'ev's *Swine Maiden and the Shepherd*, mass song, monumentalist architecture. Among the questions we will address are these: What is the relation between the state-party project of socialist realism as a theory—organizing first literature, then the other arts from 1932 on—and the diverse cultural emanations of the Stalin period? What sense can we make, on the one hand, of socialist realism's own self-characterizations and, on the other, later models of interpretation, such as those contained in Katerina Clark, Evgenii Dobrenko, Boris Groys? Historical and political theory texts will include Yuri Slezkine and Sheila Fitzpatrick. If consciousness permits, we may organize a small Stalin conference towards the end of the semester.

NOTE: This course is cross-listed as a core course in the Program for Cultural Studies as a "B" course (Disciplines and Intellectual Movements).

COURSE METHODOLOGY

Class consists of lecture, discussion, formal presentations, including a final conference. Nine one-page papers will form the basis of class presentations and discussions. Additional writing will include a

summary chart of historical and cultural events, short in-class writing assignments, and occasional quizzes, if attention seems to be lagging. Students are encouraged to consult with the instructor concerning their progress in the course.

REQUIRED WORK

- Short papers. Participants will write nine one-page papers in fifteen weeks. The papers will be approximately 750 words, 10-font, single –spaced, submitted *only* as the material is discussed in class—i.e., no make-up work. Papers must be submitted electronically to <u>condee@pitt.edu</u> by 6.00 pm on Saturday before each Tuesday's class. The topic is your choice, but must a.) have a clear research question and b.) address some combination of the assigned and additional reading.
- **Chart.** Participants are asked to keep a running (draft) chart of major historical and cultural dates so as to produce, by 13 December a final chart of approximately 5 pages. To give the participants some notion of how this might look, the instructor will show examples of previous work.
- **Presentations.** Depending on the topics and quality of the work, the one-page papers may be presented in class, or may simply form the basis of discussion. On Tuesday, 13 December, participants will offer the REES faculty a small Stalin conference, which will consist of 10-12 minutes presentations, followed by discussion and appropriate beverages.

ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to attend all classes. **More than one unexcused absence** will affect the final grade. **More than two** will result in automatic failure of the course, regardless of the student's prior standing. Excused absences, such as illness or death in the immediate family, must be documented. Airline reservations and other travel plans do not constitute excused absences. Absent students are responsible for acquiring relevant class notes and handouts **from fellow students**. Work assigned in a student's absence will not be given a later deadline without prior agreement with the instructor.

EXAMINATIONS AND QUIZZES

The course has no mid-term or final exam. Short, in-class quizzes on the assigned reading may be given without notice if the instructor feels that attention is lagging. If quizzes on major historical dates are given, the teacher will give advance notice and will distribute a list of required dates.
